# OKINAWA Okinawa Islandwide Eisa Festival



Oxio Aug 23-Aug 25 In Okinawa, where Obon is celebrated according to the lunar calendar, the dates vary each year and fall on the 13th to the 15th day of the 7th lunar month. In 2024, Obon in Okinawa will be from August 16 to August 18.

On the final day, the dance known as "Eisa" is performed, which is a significant dance to send the spirits of ancestors to the afterlife. This traditional performing art has a long history and has been passed down through generations in the local community.

Eisa, performed with the powerful sounds of the sanshin, songs, and drum rhythms, is so popular locally that it has grown into large festivals. It captivates not only the locals but also tourists.

Eisa is danced on the final day of Obon (Ukui) to send the spirits of ancestors to the afterlife, similar to Bon Odori in other parts of Japan. It is one of Okinawa's very important events, reflecting the deep respect for ancestors.

Youth associations in each district dance Eisa in various places to send off the spirits of ancestors. They parade through the streets within municipalities or areas while performing Eisa.

This is called "*Michi Junee*" and is danced not only to see off the spirits of ancestors but also to pray for the health and safety of each household and for prosperity.

The "Okinawa Island-wide Eisa Festival" is the largest Eisa festival held in Okinawa, taking place in Koza, Okinawa City, known as the town of Eisa. This year, it will be held over three days from Friday, August 23 to Sunday, August 25.

# Successful conclusion of Humanitarian Assistance, Disaster Relief training at RIMPAC 2024

#### JOINT BASE PEARL HAR-BOR-HICKAM, HAWAII - The

Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief (HADR) portion of the multinational joint exercise Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC) 2024 has come to a successful close, July 15. HADR is a military cooperation that aims to save lives, reduce suffering, and resolve emergencies during natural disasters. This year, nine nations actively participated: Canada, Chile, Germany, Japan, Mexico, Peru, Republic of Korea (ROK), Singapore and the United States.

Participants trained in a wide range of dynamic scenarios, including Urban Search and Rescue (USAR), Hawaii Healthcare Emergency Management (HHEM) mass casualty response, mass movement of evacuees, aerial survey, port restoration, and logistical support for humanitarian assistance.

"Humanitarian assistance and disaster relief is a critical part of the Navy's mission," said Vice Adm. John Wade, commander, U.S. 3rd Fleet and Exercise Rim of the Pacific (RIMPAC) 2024 Combined

Task Force (CTF). "During the HADR exercise, we trained our expeditionary forces to respond to crisis scenarios with the goal of improving our efficiency and interoperability with global maritime partners. Our forces are always at their best when we train together."

Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF) Rear Adm. Kazushi Yokota, commander, JMSDF Escort Flotilla Three and Exercise RIMPAC 2024 CTF vice commander, led the HADR portion of the exercise and collaboration with local hospital personnel.

"During this great RIMPAC, I am confident to say that we have enhanced integration, interoperability with global maritime partners and demonstrated effective communication," said Rear Adm. Yokota. "We prepared and exercised crisis response capabilities amongst interagency partners by working together, growing together and learning from each other's professionalism."

First-time achievements from this year's HADR drill included: -First time conducting USAR

with participation from Mexico, Peru and the U.S.

- -First time conducting an HHEM mass casualty event with partner nations, including Mexico, Peru, and the U.S. -First time operating with **HMCS Max Bernays (AOPV** 432), a Canadian special mission support platform and icebreaker.
- -First time operating with JS Kunisaki (LST-4003), a JMSDF Osumi-class amphibious land-
- -First time integrating U.S. Marines from Combat Logistics Company 33 (CLC-33) and Seabees from First Naval Construction Regiment (1NCR) in constructing a helo landing zone, the creation of drinking water, assessing bridges, and removing downed trees. -First time constructing a
- pagoda with combined Seabee forces from ROK and the U.S. -First time using unmanned aerial systems from Naval **Facilities Engineering Systems** Command for port surveys and

#### damage assessment.

The HADR training, which began July 8, showcased enhanced integration and effective crisis response capabilities between allies and partners in the Indo-Pacific

"It has been exciting to work with our multinational partners during RIMPAC," said Capt. Douglas Whimpey, commodore, First Naval Construction Regiment

and deputy commander, HADR Task Force. "Together, we have a tremendous opportunity to train, improve our skills and build new relationships. Training with our multinational partners strengthens our ability to operate together. That's what RIMPAC is all about."

Twenty-nine nations, 40 surface ships, three submarines, 14 national land forces, more than 150 aircraft and 25,000 personnel are

participating in RIMPAC in and around the Hawaiian Islands, June 27 to Aug. 1. The world's largest international maritime exercise, RIMPAC provides a unique training opportunity while fostering and sustaining cooperative relationships among participants critical to ensuring the safety of sea lanes and security on the world's oceans. RIMPAC 2024 is the 29th exercise in the series that began in 1971.

# U.S. Naval Hospital Okinawa Coordinated with Sister Services to Move Life-Saving Equipment Across Air, Land and Sea in Support of Emergency Services in Okinawa

OKINAWA – The Military Health System (MHS) has undergone a significant transition that has aligned all the medical assets from the different services under the Defense Health Agency's (DHA) guidance. One of the best benefits is the ability for service members to receive care seamlessly at any military medical treatment facility (MTF) run by the Navy, Air Force, or Army. Another benefit of consolidating the services is the ability to integrate and cross-level resources, which saves money and maintains a sustainable armed forces military medical system. At a recent U.S. Armed Forces Japan (USFJ) medical summit in Yokota, Japan, hosted by Lieutenant General Ricky N. Rupp and in response to Admiral John C. Aquilino's request to get to immediate small and quick wins that will improve the quality and access to medical services in Japan. It is often quite easy to get caught up in a large-scale operations and focus all your effort there, waiting for all the necessary pieces to fall into place, and that takes time. Going after quick wins can motivate and allow for immediate progress. The other key concept of this story is the power of relationships. The tenacity and perseverance of USNHO's EMS Director set the proverbial wheels in motion for a quick win.

U.S. Naval Hospital Okinawa is always striving to enhance the patient experience. One way to do this is to improve their emergency services capabilities and part of that plan includes several additional ambulances. Rather than waiting for the ordering process to take place, Capt. Kathleen Cooperman organized a small task force to look for ideas to form a bridging solution until the new ambulances are procured. A team of subject matter experts (SME) including LCDR Studer (NMRTC Okinawa EMS Director). Chief Ulysses Taormina (MCIPAC Regional Fire Chief), and LT Richardson (NMRTC Okinawa Deputy Comptroller) strategically partnered with Brian Allgood Army Hospital, Marine Corps Installation Pacific (MCIPAC), and the 3D Marine Expeditionary Force and (III MEF) to secure three ambulances for immediate use to increase access to Emergency Medical Services (EMS) on Okinawa.

The procurement of ambulances jointly improves the capabilities of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery (BUMED), the U.S. Air Force (USAF), and DHA in transporting our most vulnerable and critically ill infant patients. As NMRTC Okinawa hosts the only Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) in the

Indo-Pacific Command (INDOPACOM), it's imperative to have these ambulances to transport infants in isolettes, safely. An isolette is a clear plastic enclosed crib that maintains a warm environment for a new baby and isolates them from germs. Ambulances have historically been challenging to appropriate due to a myriad of factors. The three ambulances procured offset a substantial cost and allow for greater maneuverability in modernizing our ambulance fleet. This collaboration demonstrates our commitment to our patients, jointness, optimization, and resource stewardship for all involved.

The U.S. Navy Medicine Readiness and Training Command Okinawa (USNMRTCO) supports the Defense Health Agency's U.S. Naval Hospital, Okinawa (USNHO) as the largest OCONUS Navy Medicine medical treatment facility and stands at the ready to respond to contingency operations to support the INDOPACOM region. It is a critical regional asset for direct care delivery, regional referrals, and medical contingency operations. The staff of USNHO understands their vital role as pre-positioned, forward-deployed naval forces within the first island chain, aligned and in support of the joint military commands and operations.

#### DARWIN, NORTHERN TERRITORY, Australia –

Exercise Pitch Black 2024, the largest iteration of the Royal Australian Air Force's premiere biennial flying exercise, officially opened on July 12 in Darwin, Australia during a ceremony held at the Darwin Convention Center attended by service members from multiple countries.




